BINOCULAR TIPS

Make them fit your face

Binoculars are adjustable, and you should *definitely* adjust them to your face! Even if you are sharing with someone, it's quick to fold them so they eye pieces are further apart or closer together.

If there's a black shadow covering your view through the binoculars, adjust them! Play around with it until it works for you.

Twist the eyecups out, toward your face

The eye cups should be pulled out, toward your eye. This is very important for being able to see through the binoculars! If you wear glasses, you don't need to do this.

Practice!

Hold your eye steady on an object. Without moving your eye muscle, bring the binoculars up to meet your eyes. Did you glance away, or were you able to keep your eyes fixed on the object?

Turn the knob on top to bring the object you were looking at into focus. Practice turning the knob all the way in one direction and all the way in the other, so you can get a sense of how much it changes what you're able to see at different distances.

Gradually practice looking at objects further and further away.


Look for motion

When you're birding, your binoculars generally shouldn't come to your face until you have your naked eyes locked on a bird. Without your binoculars, look for motion (looking for motion is better than looking for a "bird shape" as that is often a leaf!). Once you have your eyes locked on the motion, put your practice into action, and without moving your eye muscle, bring the binoculars up to your eyes. Keeping your eyes fixed on the location with the binoculars to your eyes, turn the knob on top. If the bird hasn't left the location, you should be able to see the bird!

Stick with it!

Using binoculars is a skill that takes time to develop. Keep practicing, and be proud of yourself for working at keeping your eyes still and bringing the binoculars into focus!

Ready to take your birding to the next level?

ebird

Use ebird to explore birding "hotspots" near you. Check out the lists of birds (including pictures, sounds, and tips for identification) that can be seen at specific locations. By looking at these lists before you go out birding, you'll have sense of what to look for.

Click a hotspot, select "Bar Charts," and select the season. You'll see a list of all the birds that have been sighted there, and how often they've been seen – very helpful if you want to study up on how to identify a few of the species before you head out;)

Create an ebird account and record birds you see every time you go on a bird walk! You can get the ebird app on your phone. It helps you understand what birds you are likely to see in a given area, helps with identification, and shows your progress over time! Ebird has a lot to offer, so if you want to get into birding, you should definitely spend some time clicking around.

Merlin Bird

This app is very helpful for identifying birds.

Sibley Birds West

This is the gold standard for bird guides. If you want to get into birding, this is a great tool to have! Even more comprehensive for identification than the apps, and fun to page through to learn more about the birds.

Binoculars

If you want good binoculars, I recommend the Celestron Nature.
