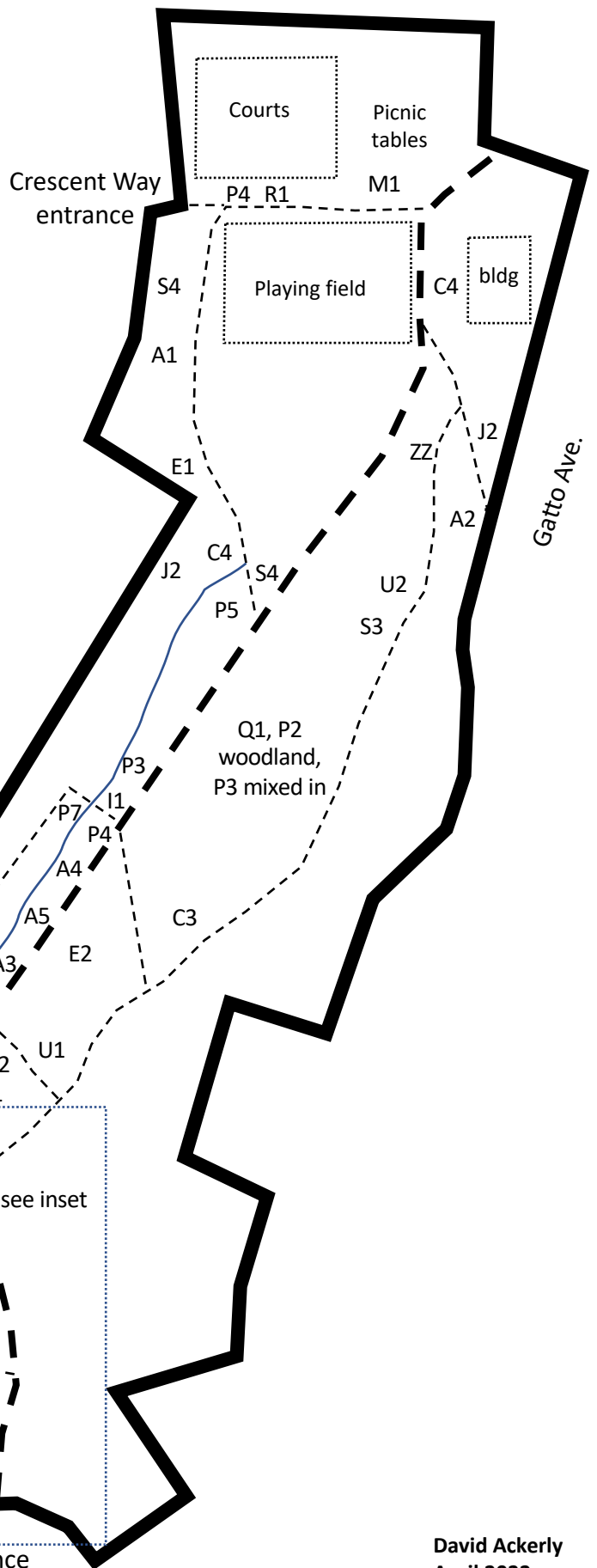
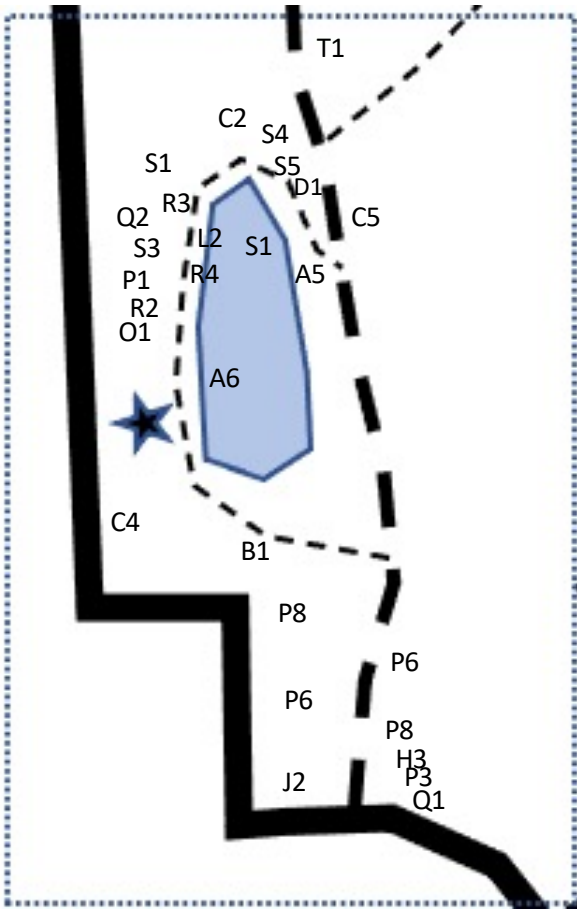

Code	Scientific Name	Common Name	Native Range	Notes
A1	<i>Acacia dealbata</i>	Silver wattle	Australia	Frilly, twice compound leaves
A2	<i>Acacia melanoxylon</i>	Australian blackwood	E. Australia	Entire leaves, actually a 'phyllode' (look it up!)
A3	<i>Acer macrophyllum</i>	Bigleaf maple	West Coast	Large, palmate lobed, opp. leaves
A4	<i>Acer negundo</i>	Ashleaf maple	N. America	Pinnate compound opp. leaves
A5	<i>Aesculus californica</i>	Buckeye	California	Palmate compound, opp. leaves; big fruits
A6	<i>Alnus rhombifolia</i>	White alder	Western NA	Riparian tree, fruits are cone-like
A7	<i>Artemisia californica</i>	California sage	Coastal CA	Wispy, light green, aromatic leaves
B1	<i>Baccharis pilularis</i>	Coyotebush	CA	Weedy shrub, common throughout Bay Area
C1	<i>Casuarina equisetifolia</i>	Australian pine	Australia	Not a pine! The 'needles' are leafless twigs
C2	<i>Cornus sericea</i>	Red Osier dogwood	CA	Opp lvs, white flowers, berries for birds
C3	<i>Corylus cornuta</i>	Beaked hazelnut	CA	Sharply toothed leaf edges, understory shrub
C4	<i>Cotoneaster lacteus</i>	Late cotoneaster	China	Red berries, Rose family, large leaves
C5	<i>Cotoneaster pannosus</i>	Silverleaf cotoneaster	China	Red berries, Rose family, small leaves
D1	<i>Diplacus aurantiacus</i>	Sticky monkeyflower	CA	Orange flowers, always in pairs, sticky leaves
E1	<i>Eriobotrya japonica</i>	Loquat	China	Big leaves and fruits
E2	<i>Eucalyptus sideroxylon</i>	Red ironbark	Australia	Dark bark eucalypt, not sure where it is in park
G1	<i>Genista monspessulana</i>	French broom	Med. Europe	Highly invasive, beautiful yellow flowers
H1	<i>Hedera canariensis</i>	Madeira ivy	Canary Isl.	Lvs with small points, upright vine
H2	<i>Hedera helix</i>	Common ivy	Europe, Asia	3-5 point leaf, sprawling vine
H3	<i>Heteromeles arbutifolia</i>	Toyon	CA	Red berries late in year; rose family
I1	<i>Ilex aquifolium</i>	Holly	Europe	The true holly, dark green lvs with sharp points
J1	<i>Jasminum</i>	Jasmine	Eur, Asia, Afr	Aromatic, climbing vine
J2	<i>Juniperus sp.</i>	Juniper	CA	Needle-leaved shrub; berries make gin
L1	<i>Ligustrum sp.</i>	Privet	Eur, Asia	Opposite, simple, shiny green leaves
L2	<i>Lonicera hispidula</i>	Pink honeysuckle	CA	Trailing vine
M1	<i>Morus alba</i>	Mulberry	Eur, Asia	Food source for silkworm!
O1	<i>Oemleria cerasiformis</i>	Osoberry	CA	Delicate leaves, drooping flowers in spring
P1	<i>Physocarpus capitatus</i>	Pacific ninebark	CA	Palmate lobed leaf, white flowers
P2	<i>Pinus radiata</i>	Monterey pine	CA	Big trees, with cones ready to burst after fire
P3	<i>Pittosporum undulatum</i>	Mock orange	E. Australia	Common, wavy leaf edge, fleshy orange fruits
P4	<i>Platanus racemosa</i>	California sycamore	CA	Palmate leaf, large fruits
P5	<i>Prunus laurocerasus</i>	Cherry laurel	Europe	Evergreen, large leaves and inflorescences
P6	<i>Prunus sp.</i>	Flowering cherry	Asia, prob	The common cherry around town
P7	<i>Prunus sp.</i>	Red leaf cherry	Asia, prob	Maybe horticultural variety of flowering cherry
P8	<i>Pyracantha sp.</i>	Firethorn	Old world	Another red berry, rose family!
Q1	<i>Quercus agrifolia</i>	Coast live oak	CA	Evergreen oak, dominant native in local parks
Q2	<i>Quercus lobata</i>	Valley oak	CA	Deciduous oak, small one planted behind pond
R1	<i>Raphiolepis indica</i>	Indian hawthorn	SE Asia	
R2	<i>Ribes sp.</i>	Gooseberry	CA	Thorny, small individual flowers
R3	<i>Ribes sanguineum</i>	Flowering currant	CA	No thorns, hanging, pink inflorescences
R4	<i>Rosa californica</i>	California wild rose	CA	Thorns, compound leaves, 5 petaled flower
S1	<i>Salix sp.</i>	Willow	CA	Maybe several willow species in the park
S3	<i>Sambucus nigra</i>	Black elderberry	CA	Palmate compound opp. leaves
S4	<i>Sequoiadendron sempervirens</i>	Redwood	CA	Redwood! What more can we say?
S5	<i>Symphoricarpos sp.</i>	Snowberry	CA	Opp lvs, thumbs, white berries
T1	<i>Toxicodendron diversiloba</i>	Poison oak	CA	Don't touch! Leaves in three, often reddish
U1	<i>Ulmus sp.</i>	Elm		Alt lvs, asymmetric leaf base, toothed edges
U2	<i>Umbellularia californica</i>	California Bay	CA	Alt, evergreen leaves, aromatic
ZZ	Unknown!!!
